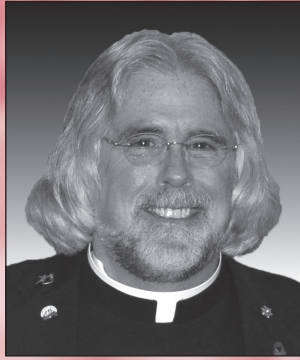

Statement of Mission

The Mission of Hope House Ministries is founded in the spirit of St. Louis de Montfort, who had a commitment to the poor and the courage to do what no one else had the courage to do.

This is our mission: To provide compassionate, comprehensive and competent care for the poor, the marginal and the wounded among us. This commitment is woven in the Gospel vision that all life is sacred and every human person is unique and has the right to be respected and protected. Specifically, we are committed to young people and families in crisis, pregnant women and mothers and babies in crisis and all other wounded people within our society, who are seen as abandoned and neglected. Thus, we seek to be men and women of hope in a world of shattered dreams.

Agency Overview

Founded in April 1980, what began as a 10-bed facility providing compassionate crisis intervention for young men aged 16 to 21, has expanded to a multi-faceted agency encompassing counseling, educational and residential assistance for individuals and families in crisis!

Hope House Ministries now offers services through multiple outreach programs that focus on restoring hope to the lives of those less fortunate, while all services remain free of charge. An important part of the success of our ministry has been the generosity of individuals and businesses who, in sharing our mission, have selflessly offered their volunteer and monetary assistance.



Words of Hope/Ministry Testimonials ~ Two Lives Transformed

I clearly remember the first day I heard about Father Frank and “Hope House”. It was my 35th birthday and I had taken time out of my busy drug-dealing schedule to have lunch with my mother and father in NYC. We were in a coffee shop across the street from Penn Station; it was late May and summer was in full effect. They were close to tears and begged me to come back to Long Island with them because they felt they were losing me. “There’s a place in Port Jeff, run by a priest. It’s not like other rehabs. You can actually stay there indefinitely, go back to school, and reclaim your life.” I didn’t have a life. I had stopped living long ago. I was a daily IV crystal meth user living on the streets of Manhattan and had no intention of going to rehab. After all, I had already done the rehab thing, numerous times, and it just did not work. Did I ever think I’d be the face of addiction? No way. After all, I came from a loving family; my father was a social worker that dealt with addiction on a daily basis. I graduated High School in the top 10% of my class; I was in the church folk group as a kid, played the piano, was an awesome gymnast. I was in an Off-Broadway play at 23 years old. I had everything the world would say was a recipe for success. And frankly, I always thought of people that did drugs as losers. I told my parents that I would think about it and walked out of the coffee shop. I made my way up 7th Avenue with a pocketful of meth and heart full of sadness. The ‘moment of clarity’ passed me by. I never stopped using long enough to face the wreckage I was creating around me. I missed my grandmother’s funeral, my sister’s wedding, the birth of my niece; one important event after another. Life went on and I continued on my path of self-destruction.

Less than a year later I was arrested in Palm Springs, CA, by the DEA. I was facing up to 10 years in prison. Now I had plenty of time to look at myself. I wrote to Father Frank from my prison cell in downtown Manhattan, poured out my life to him. He responded and said I could come to Hope House. Unfortunately, my judge felt that jail was what I deserved. I was sentenced to 36 months in Federal Prison. I survived. I stayed clean. I started seeking God. I rebuilt family relationships. I began to find myself. After my release I was sent to a halfway house in the Bronx. Entering society again was a shock that I was not prepared for but I did my best. I got a job at the Central Park Zoo. I started attending self-help meetings. I kept in touch with my probation officer, who wanted me to succeed. I thought I was doing well. I wanted to go back to school but didn’t even know where to start. I wanted so badly to stay sober but between work, bills, meetings and parole, I found little time to feed my soul. I got overwhelmed. I gave up on myself. I went back to what I knew how to do best. I relapsed. I was devastated. But that’s the reality of addiction. A person who has spent years and years of daily drug use has to be patient and surrounded by support. Addiction doesn’t just go away.

I spent another disastrous two years in hell, this time on the run from parole. There were numerous overdoses; I woke up in emergency rooms all over NYC barely even knowing my name. I did any kind of drug I could get my hands on, substances that would make a chemist cringe. I spent every waking moment looking over my shoulder, waiting for ‘them’ to get me. Inevitably I got caught and arrested again. I spent 3 months in prison wishing I were dead, wondering how this had happened again. On the night before my sentencing, my dad urged me to write to Father Frank again. I thought it was pointless since he would never get my letter in time, but I did it anyway. My judge got sick and my sentencing was pushed back a week. Is that odd or God? Father Frank got my letter and accepted me into the program. This time the judge agreed. And on September 11, 2015, I arrived in handcuffs at Hope House Ministries, where my life began anew.

I vividly remember meeting Father Frank that night for the first time. His office looked like a cyclone had hit it. He had a grin on his face and said, “Well, you finally made it here.” He suggested that I figure out what I wanted to do with my life and ‘WE’ would find a way to make that happen. ‘WE’ was a word long removed from my vocabulary. I saw life as a solitary journey with everyone in the world out for themselves. The only thing that could have saved me was to be placed in an environment that had the polar opposite view. And that is exactly what Hope House is. Immediately, I was hit with love, from every direction. The staff is hard working and dedicated, and that is an understatement. There are volunteers aplenty that fill numerous roles. They cook dinner, they run groups, they teach, they donate; they give and give and give. I needed to be submerged in a world of service in order to believe that there was still good ‘out there’. I took suggestions, I listened, and I realized right away that I was being given the opportunity of a lifetime. I rekindled my passion for music, which addiction had almost robbed me of. I started praying as if my life depended on it. I became part of a community, something I never knew before.

Fast-forward 5+ years, I am still sober; including cigarettes, which alone is a miracle. I am a full-time voice major at Suffolk Community College and I was helped every step of the way to make that dream a reality. I am part of The HIMS, a musical group full of incredibly talented people that reside here. We sing at mass and our music is having an impact on so many lives. I am an active member of AA where I am taught to help others. I am a son, a brother and a friend. And I have only just begun.

Living with 40 men with the same personality is a challenge and an adventure but I am proud to call Hope House my home; and I am forever grateful to Father Frank, Charlie Russo, and every single person that helps bring Hope House Ministries to life. There’s just nowhere else like it.

*M*y life to some may seem like one filled with sadness, but today I can see that my life, although filled with hardships, is an absolute blessing. My childhood was filled with joy and overall positivity. I grew up on Long Island in a loving family consisting of one older brother, one younger sister, and a mother and father who were both present throughout my life. I had every opportunity a child should have. I loved all sports growing up but played soccer mostly. I also practiced Martial Arts from the age of 5 to 18, and earned my black belt at 9 years old, earning me the title of the youngest black belt in New York State at the time. I was a good student and an overall disciplined kid growing up. I accomplished everything I set my mind to. I had great girlfriends, even better friends, and the best family a child can ask for. I attended Church every weekend with my family, and even went to Catholic school until fourth grade. On the outside I seemed to be a happy, healthy person but looking back, I had always felt a void. I can't remember when I first felt it, but I can remember its presence in my teenage years.

At 18 years old I was diagnosed with cancer. The most troubling part of being diagnosed with the deadly disease was my lack of feeling towards the diagnosis. I can remember this feeling of indifference when being told I had cancer and accepting death. Looking back, this was the defining moment for the years to come in my life. Instead of sharing my feelings with my family, I acted tough, never cried and did everything the doctors asked of me without question. It seemed everyone around me wanted me to live more than I did myself. Unfortunately, in America, health insurance isn't the greatest, so my parents did everything they could to help pay for my treatment. My father campaigned for donations from his fellow union members, collecting thousands of dollars to help pay for my treatment. After four surgeries and years of treatment, it seemed I was going to live after all. The problem was I had forgotten how to live and found comfort in the prescription pills I was given after my surgeries. This "comfort" eventually spiraled into an addiction to heroin. The addiction took me to places I never imagined. I became someone I despised, which led me further into my addiction. Everyone around me loved me, but I had lost the love I once had for myself. Eventually my girlfriend at the time left me. I lost my job and isolated myself from all those who loved me. The further I fell into my addiction, the lonelier I felt.

After several overdoses, I found myself in a psych ward on Christmas Eve 2013, wondering how this could have happened to me. My parents did not know what to do. After trying everything they could, my father reached out to one of his high school football teammates, Charlie Russo, who dropped everything he was doing to meet with me. Charlie explained to me what the program of Hope House was and it all sounded great to me at the time, except for the 18-month part. I argued with him for a bit and explained I could not stay for 18 months. I instead spent the next couple of years trying every other short-term rehab around,

even traveling to treatment centers in Queens and Brooklyn. I accomplished getting clean several times but was never able to stay clean. In November 2015, Charlie once again took time out of his busy schedule to meet with me, a complete stranger, offering his help. He explained the same program to me, but this time I was desperate enough to do anything. A month later, on December 23, 2015, I came to Hope House. It happened to be the day we moved into the friary. I can remember thinking to myself how beautiful the place was, and how different it was from any other place I've been to. The first thing that was asked of me when I arrived was to write three things down on an index card that I wanted for Christmas. After seeing the confused look on my face, it was then explained to me that Father Frank would like to buy me gifts for Christmas. I knew right then and there that Hope House was radically different from any other place around. The next day on Christmas Eve I attended Christmas Magic, one of the many charitable events ran by Charlie Russo. I spent my first day sober between hundreds of happy kids and Santa Claus. Already I began to feel useful again, and just a tiny portion of self-love crept back up. It was truly amazing; I became a believer in Hope House overnight. I immediately trusted everyone here at Hope House and began to open up and finally let people in to help me. I can honestly say that is all I did; the rest was done by Father Frank, Charlie Russo and the countless workers, volunteers, and benefactors that contribute to this wonderful place.

Hope House not only saved my life, but my older brother's as well. He has recently graduated the academy, and as he said at his commencement, he "has become the

man he has always wanted to be." This is the gift that Hope House has afforded us all, to become the best versions of ourselves. Today I am clean for over five years, and have finally found out who I am. I am a compassionate, loving, strong man who enjoys helping others. For the first time in my life I am optimistic about my future and have worthwhile goals to achieve. I have obtained my Bachelor's degree in Social Sciences from St. Joseph's College and will be graduating in May with my Master's degree in Social Work from Fordham University. I am currently employed by Hope House Ministries working as a child care worker at Montfort Therapeutic Residence and am also employed by the Diocese of Rockville Centre Department of Education as a school Social Worker. I couldn't be happier! I finally found what I was looking for my entire life here at Hope House, and that is what every human longs for, a purpose. My purpose today is to help those in need as others have helped me.

Hope House Ministries provides hope, care and compassion to nearly 2,000 individuals in need each month.

The Community House

Since its founding in 1980, the Community House with 10 beds has grown to a 30-bed house that provides a compassionate approach to crisis intervention and a residential community for homeless young people in need. The program serves primarily youth between the ages of 16 and 21 years. It offers a creative living space where a young person can grow and develop.

Hope Academy at Little Portion Friary

A long-term non-traditional residential treatment program for addiction (minimum 12-18 months).

Pax Christi Hospitality Center

This twenty-five bed emergency center for men over 16, provides those in need on Long Island a compassionate, temporary residence offering three components: shelter and food, human needs and services, advocacy and networking.

Project Hope II

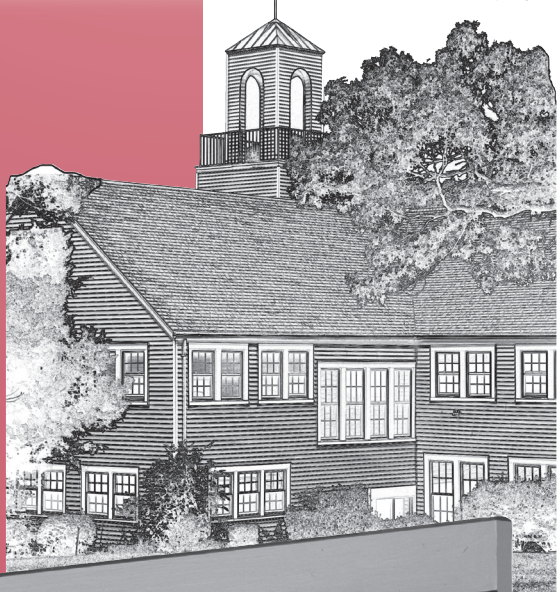
Project Hope II, under the aegis of the Pax Christi Hospitality Center, is a program specifically designed to serve the chronic homeless population, people who are underserved and serve as a response for community concerns.

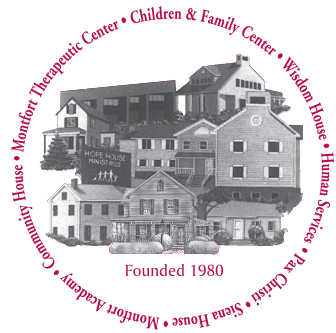
The Human Services Center

Staffed by a host of highly qualified professional counselors, the Human Services Center serves thousands of adults and young people in the course of a year. Included in the counseling services are individual, marital and family counseling, addiction counseling including alcoholism, co-dependency, eating disorders and sexual abuse. The center also serves as a meeting place for various therapy groups and several twelve-step programs.

The Sr. Jean Beagan, O.P. Family and Children's Center

The Family and Children's Center of Hope House Ministries is dedicated to the growth and development of children. It does this by enhancing the ability of parents to provide opportunities for children to live, love and work with a sense of mutual well-being.





**Montfort Therapeutic Residence/
Our Lady of Peace Academy**

This program, which began in 2007, is an intensive therapeutic treatment facility for children ages 11-18 who find themselves caught in the family court system. These children come to us at a time of great crisis in their young lives and we provide them with a healthy, stable environment, a school program, individual counseling, group dynamics and educational and recreational outings. Its greatest gift is providing aftercare services when a young person returns home.

St. Louis de Montfort Academy

Montfort Academy is our free standing alternative junior-senior high school. Individualized instruction and private tutoring are provided by qualified teachers according to each student's needs. Montfort Academy's staff consists of a principal and volunteer teachers.

Wisdom House

A residence designated for long-term needs of both men and women, 21 years of age and older, who find themselves in a situation of crisis or homelessness and are in need of a semi-structured living environment. The goal of Wisdom House is to help the individual make a transition into a state of independent living.

Siena House

Siena House is a home for women and women with children, 21 years and older, who have suffered from domestic violence and/or are in crisis or transition. This program offers a safe, supportive environment while empowering women to move toward independent living and permanent housing.

**St. Maximilian Kolbe Outpatient
Addictions Treatment Center**

The St. Maximilian Kolbe Outpatient Addictions Treatment Center provides comprehensive outpatient services for people motivated to enter and sustain recovery. Through individual and group counseling sessions, each day struggling addicts reclaim their lives.

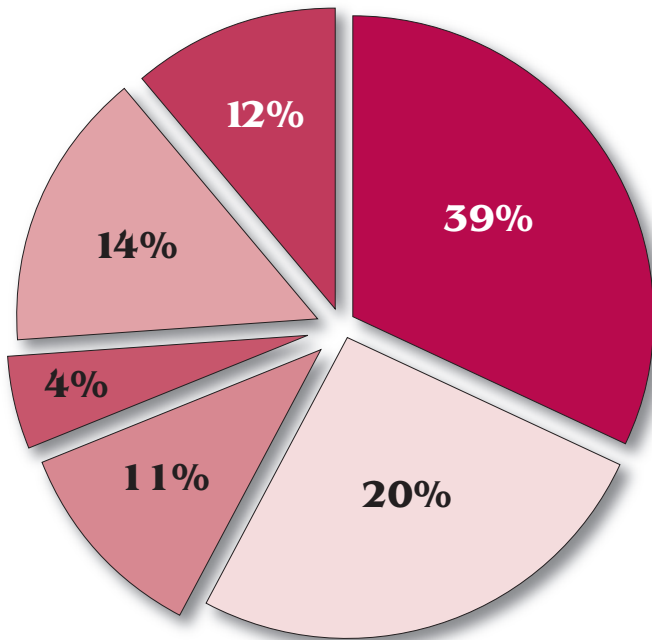
